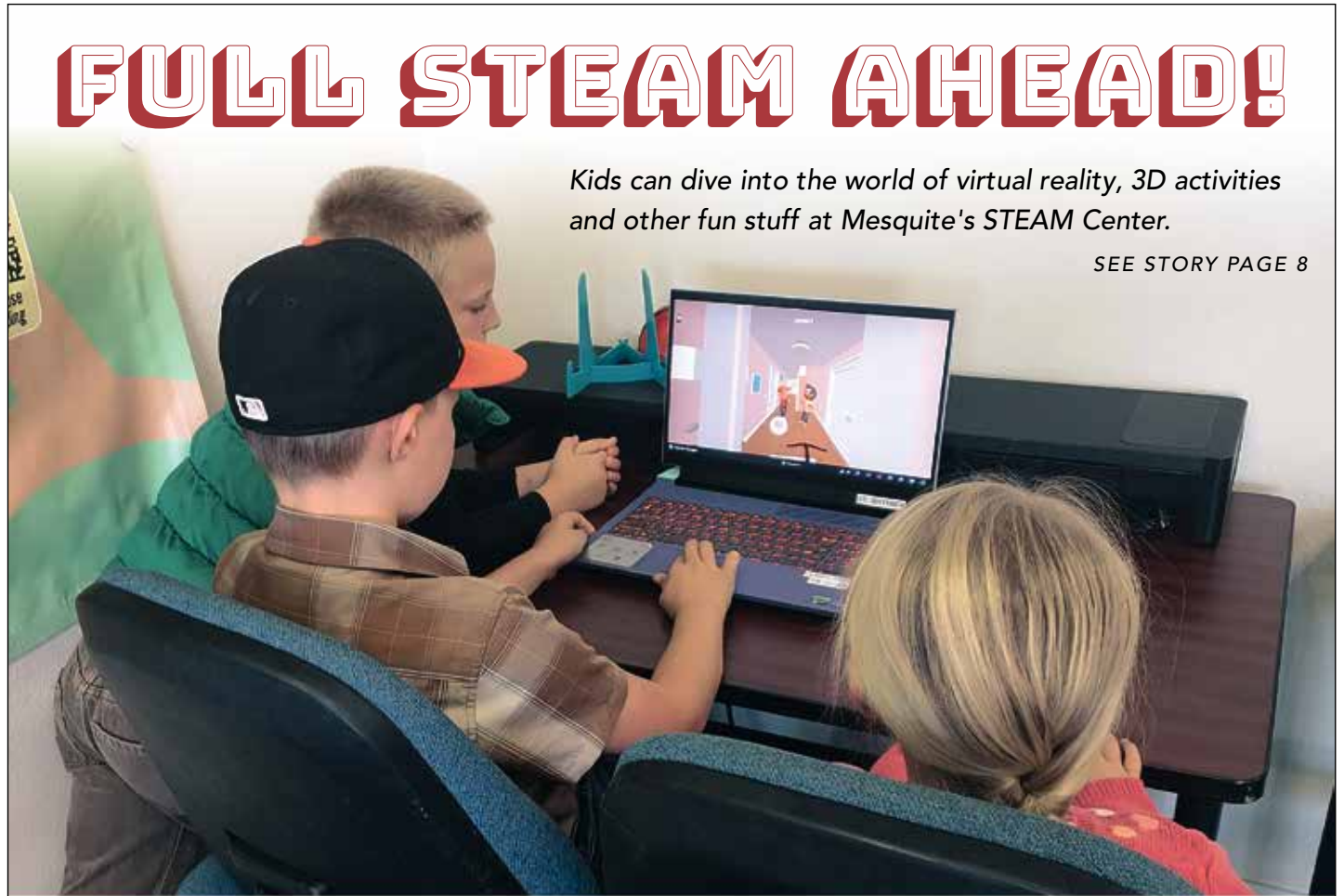

Wursten brothers honored for Golf Fore Kids event

The opportunity that comes with giving back goes a long way, especially when donations go to kids and underserved families during the holiday season.

As a result of the long-term legacy that brothers, Rob and Brian Wursten, have built, they are now receiving one of the most prestigious honors in Clark County.

For two decades, the Wursten brothers have led the Golf Fore Kids charity tournament, one of the most charitable golf events in Mesquite.

Their dedication has led to the Las Vegas Golf Hall of Fame recognizing the tournament by choosing to induct the Wursten brothers and the Golf Fore Kids community at its upcoming ceremony on Nov. 8 at HyperX Arena inside the Luxor Hotel and Casino on the Las Vegas Strip.

Speaking with Brian Wursten, the Director of Golf for Mesquite Entertainment, he expressed his deep appreciation upon hearing that both he and his brother, in addition to the tournament, would be inducted.

"This is about this community," Brian Wursten said. "The Golf Fore Kids

event is what is really getting into the Hall of Fame more than Rob and I. It's the event, and it's because the city is so much a part of this. They are. They're tied into it."

"There's so many people that work the event. The police department, the fire department, we get Virgin Valley High School involved. We get multiple golf courses that are involved and the hotel. There's so many people who are volunteering and are part of it. This is really the community, in my mind. It's the community being inducted into the Hall of Fame. Not so much Rob and I."

This charity tournament takes place every December. This year, the 21st annual Golf Fore Kids tournament is slated for Dec. 11. It is a four-person scramble, and because of the high demand, four courses are used: Falcon Ridge, Palms, Palmer, and Conestoga.

"We get 560 golfers, and four golf courses donate their courses," Brian Wursten said. "We have a hotel that donates their venue for the dinner, and the city donates the area to hold the toys until the Salvation Army can get them out. It's such an all-encompassing city event."

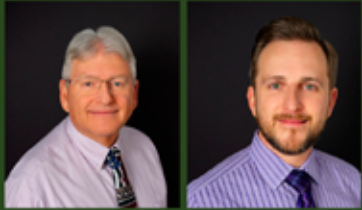

Volleyball ends 16-year drought with league title

For the last couple of years, the Virgin Valley High School girls volleyball program has continued its upward trend.

The Bulldogs reached their next step toward prominence when they defeated Moapa Valley in four sets (25-13, 18-25, 25-19, 25-11) on Oct. 22 to claim the outright 3A South-Desert title—their first in 16 years.

"I'm just super excited and grateful," said Head Coach Kortney Tobler. "The girls have worked hard, and I think it's well deserved."

The Bulldogs were led by their two seniors, Julia Leavitt and Hayden Owsley, who both recorded double-doubles against the Pirates. Leavitt recorded 15 digs, 14 kills, and two aces, while Owsley logged 17 digs, 12 kills, and five total blocks.

"They're good hitters; they're good blockers," Tobler said. "They terminate on the net for us, and they're great leaders. They do a great job of just being steady out there and confident."

In addition, Leavitt was one of four players with two aces as Virgin Valley recorded nine total aces in the win.

"One of the great advantages about our team is we don't just rely on one player to do all the heavy lifting," Tobler said. "We all share in that. We had just fantastic net play all night. Our blockers were doing such a great job. We had some great servers go back and take turns and just serve really well."

One of the key victories leading up to securing the league title came on Oct.

14 on the road against The Meadows School, a team that has won several state championships over the last few years.

On Sept. 8, The Meadows School had gotten the best of Virgin Valley, winning in five sets.

So, it was fitting that the October meeting between the two schools also went the distance.

Through three sets, the Bulldogs trailed two sets to one. However, that didn't stop them for the rest of the match.

After dominating the fourth set 25-13, Virgin Valley won a tight fifth set, 15-13, to secure the crucial match.

Sophomore Kinley Hughes recorded 24 kills and 22 digs. Owsley also recorded a double-double with 12 kills and 12 digs. Junior Mady Wright added 25 digs from the back row, and Tobler's daughter, Mayzie, recorded 38 assists and 14 digs for a double-double of her own.

"She's been a huge player for us all year," Tobler said of Hughes. "She has come along a lot this year. I really have great defenders. If we keep the ball from hitting the floor, it creates momentum for our team."

The victory over the rival Pirates marked six straight wins to end the season and 12 wins in the final 13 matches.

"As a coach, that's always the key," Tobler said on finishing the season strong. "I feel really good about the volleyball we've been playing. Our practices are really intense. They're working hard, and we're definitely playing the best volleyball we've played all year. So that's exactly what we want."

STEAM Center provides learning place for kids

Right in the heart of town is a place where kids can learn about Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math—also known as STEAM.

The Mesquite Works STEAM Center, which sits right on Mesquite Boulevard, is a facility where kids can dive into the world of virtual reality, 3D printing, and many other STEAM-related activities.

“I love math, too, but with science, you can incorporate everything that you want,” said Nikki Meador, the Director of the STEAM Center. “You can take flowers and look at the art of the flowers. We’ve exploded volcanoes, and we do robotics. We do STEM activities with preschoolers, and we do STEM activities with anybody that walks through the door.”

Meador, who has been with the STEAM Center for a few years, brings 25 years of experience in STEM education, teaching math, science, robotics, and Computer Aided Design (CAD). Her background also includes Career and Technical Education (CTE) and running robotics programs in the Clark County School District.

Prior to Meador coming to the STEAM Center, and before the COVID-19 pandemic, Mesquite Works’ focus was centered on free job training and assistance, as well as hosting job fairs.

However, because the pandemic reduced the number of job seekers, the non-profit organization changed its focus to youth, aiming to spark creativity, curiosity, and innovation. As a result, the STEAM Center was implemented in 2023.

Fast forward to the present, the STEAM Center has expanded to a 7,000-square-foot facility, primarily serving Pre-K to 12th-grade students.

“We just had a classroom and what looked to be like an office room,” Meador said. “There was a meeting table set up in there. It wasn’t really designed for kids at the time. So when I started, I changed things around



and made sure there was a place for the kids to play, as well as classrooms. Now, we have five rooms altogether. One of those is larger than the others, and we have over 1,100 members [up from 76 two years ago].”

In just those two years, Meador and her staff have witnessed the growth in the children who attend, whether it’s for one of the weekly classes or just to have some fun.

“It’s been really cool because we’ve had kids come through the door that were nonverbal, that had other things going on, and then seeing them communicate with the other kids,” Meador said. “Being able to watch some of the kids grow up over the last couple of years, it was a lot of fun as well. We have a four-year-old that can run a ToyBox 3D printer, and he can explain it and how to run it. To see that light bulb go off and to see them express themselves, that’s really good, and the communication that goes on between the kids is a lot of fun.”

Some of the weekly classes include a morning homeschool STEAM course on Tuesdays and an afternoon digital design class.

These classes provide kids with the chance to learn about things that can-

not easily be taught in a living room or a bedroom.

“Science is so hard to teach at home because of equipment technology,” Meador said. “It’s expensive, so they might not have access to that equipment, and to have it here and to be offered, that’s an opportunity.”

As the supplies come with a cost, the Mesquite Works STEAM Center relies solely on donations and community support, keeping the facility free for kids.

With no support from federal, state, or local funding, Meador said the Mesquite community plays a crucial role in keeping the place a location for the kids to learn.

“Those community donations really show that it’s a value to the community for us,” she said. “Not having federal donations also means that we don’t have the oversight that federal grants have. We’re able to do what’s best for kids. It’s all about the kids. It’s all about people coming in. I really mean kids of all ages. You might be 40 years old and come in and play in the sandbox.”

While the primary age demographic has changed because of the STEAM Center, there is still an av-

enue for adults, continuing the focus from before the pandemic.

Although it may not directly mean having a class, there is still an opportunity for Meador or staff to pass on their knowledge.

“We’re also here to help adults with technology and or resumes or what they need,” Meador said. “We’re more than willing to do that.”

In addition to having weekly classes, the STEAM Center also hosts events when school is not in session.

Meador said that the STEAM Center hosts camps to continue the learning environment outside of school.

“The summer months seem to be our busier months,” she said. “We do summer camps, one for spring break. We do those camps as an opportunity for kids to have something to do when they’re off.”

As the STEAM Center continues to roll on, they know how vital a service they provide in teaching the future generation.

“Parents are very excited that they can bring their kids somewhere to not just play,” Executive Board Member and Vice Chair Steve Dudrow said. “There’s some play, but they’re learning.”

MSG: Tudor recaps softball, previews golf and bowling

Last month, the first of three events in the Mesquite Senior Games (MSG) commenced with the men's softball tournament.

Men's Softball Recap: From Oct. 4-14, competition was on display among five different age brackets at Pioneer Park. The weather conditions were significantly better than the previous year.

"The whole tournament went really well," said Sandy Tudor, Mesquite Senior Games President and softball event director. "The teams are always happy to be here. This year, we were 20 degrees cooler than we were last year, and I took credit for that. I told them I did everything I could to keep them from being too hot. We had all age groups play some kind of a tournament. A couple of them were small, and they just played a three-team Round Robin and then a single elimination. But everybody had a good time and is looking forward to next year's tournament."

Teams traveled from all across the United States to compete, which gives people the chance to experience Mesquite while playing softball.

"We had two teams from Alaska who play each other all the time at home, but they still come down here and play each other again," Tudor said. "And then they go to St. George and play each other again. There's a lot of friendship and camaraderie

that goes with these players."

Ultimately, the MSG men's softball tournament serves as a tune-up for the Huntsman World Senior Games in St. George, Utah. It gives the teams some practice to shake off the rust while competing in Nevada's fastest-growing city.

"Some of them haven't played in months, so it helps them a lot," Tudor said. Tudor coordinates the MSG tournament to take place just before the Huntsman World Senior Games age bracket tournaments so that teams can stop in Mesquite en route to Utah.

In addition to the competition, Tudor said she reached her goals with the snack bar, in terms of getting volunteers and keeping everyone well-fed.

"It went really well," she said. "The only volunteers we need are for the concession stand because the umpires are paid umpires from various places; a couple of them are local, and some of them were here for Huntsman. One day, there were two teams playing, and it was really slow. I think I manned the snack bar by myself. I did \$17 before they finished. They finished and started eating, and I did \$150 after they finished. So it was good."

When it comes to the snack bar, prices are meant to value the customer and not be overpriced.

"We make a little money, we cover our costs, we make a little money, and we keep them happy," Tudor said.

"But this one gal said, 'My God, a hot dog and a soda would cost me \$9 in Vegas. It's \$3 here.' I said, 'Well, I think we have our priorities straight.' We're not doing this to make money. We're doing it to keep you guys happy and cover our costs, so we're good at that."

Golf Tournament Preview: After softball, there is a couple of weeks of downtime before the next event: the golf tournament, which takes place Nov. 5 at Coyote Willows, a nine-hole course.

"Everybody's looking forward to golf," Tudor said. "We've got a food truck coming, so everybody should be happy with that."

Tudor said the event is full with about 72 golfers now preparing to play the nine-hole course twice. This year, the winning opportunities have been expanded by event director Shawn Edwards.

In addition to playing as a two-person team (in scramble and best ball format) for the best overall score, medals will be handed out for individual play. These individual awards will be based on gender and within five-year age brackets (50-54, 55-59, 60-64, 65-69, etc.).

"It seems to work well, because that way people get to play with who they want, regardless of their age limitations," Tudor said, noting there will be a team consisting of someone who is 84 years old and someone who is 64 years old.

After the competition on the course, there will be a raffle after the tournament, which is currently being prepared for by Edwards, Tudor, and the committee. Prizes include wind chimes, water bottles, and more. People are welcome to donate prizes both before and on the day of the tournament.

"Absolutely, we'll take prizes on the day of the tournament," she said. "I'll take raffle prizes, not a problem. It seems to me that the golf course gave us a raffle prize last year as we were registering people."

Bowling Tournament Preview: After golf, the final event of the fall season and the calendar year takes place with the holiday 9-pin No Tap bowling event.

The tournament is scheduled for Dec. 6 at the Virgin River Hotel and Casino Bowling Center. Registration opened on Oct. 27, and the last day to register, if the event is not full, is Nov. 25. There will be three games of play, which will follow all United States Bowling Congress (USBC) rules.

This year's theme is Winter Wonderland.

"One of our former board members, who's an incredible artist, is doing some bowling pins decorated as snowman and penguin and some other stuff," Tudor said. "We'll use those as raffle prizes for bowling, as well as decoration. I think the T-shirts are going to have 'Santa's favorite bowler' or something on them."

Not only is the demand high, but it comes in fast. All 560 players, or 140 teams, sign up on the morning registration opens on Oct. 1.

Even though 560 people sign up to play, there are still ways to be part of this holiday event.

People are welcome to make donations, donate prizes for their raffle, or even volunteer.

“I stopped playing in it because I wanted other people to have the opportunity,” Wursten said. “They can show up and help. We can always use people at the dinner. We can always use more gifts. We can always use raffle prizes. They can get involved in doing all of that. That would definitely help.”

All the funds raised to benefit the kids then turn into monetary or physical donations, followed by priceless memories for the kids and their parents alike.

The gifts are distributed to underprivileged children in the Virgin Valley, Moapa Valley, and Beaver Dam areas.

Over the years, Brian and Rob have seen the kids’ reactions when they open up their gifts and find a new teddy bear or a new bike.

“We’ve been able to see a lot of that,” Wursten said. “We’ve been able to see the parents as they’ve come in to pick up the toys. And it’s such a heartwarming thing. I wish that everybody got to see that part of it, too.”

After last year’s 20th charity golf tournament, Golf Fore Kids has raised more than \$1 million for local kids and families.

“It means a lot because it is an incredibly large number that we—that the community has raised—to give kids Christmas on Christmas morning,” Brian Wursten said. “I know that my brother and I both have been involved in different ways, with watching Christmas that doesn’t go well for kids. It’s always heartbreaking. It’s nice to be able to help the other way so that doesn’t happen.”

It was Rob Wursten who first came up with this idea of having a holiday

charity tournament near the turn of the century.

From the initial idea, the charity tournament has never been turned down.

“He had put something together similar to that down in Phoenix, but on a teeny-tiny scale compared to this,” Brian Wursten said. “So, we took it to the owners of Falcon Ridge, and they just ate it up. They loved the idea. Every golf course that we’ve introduced it to has absolutely loved the idea, and they always want to be a part of it.”

Even during 2020 when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the demand for the tournament to take place was still high.

“We said, ‘I don’t know that we should have it this year because of Covid,’ and the other golf courses were so, so big on not letting it get away that we had it,” Wursten said.

Brian and Rob Wursten and the Golf Fore Kids Community are one of four inductees, in addition to a fifth honoree receiving this year’s Lifetime Achievement Award.

Although neither Brian nor Rob play golf to the level of some of the other inductees in this year’s or past classes, they are still honored to be part of the celebratory evening.

“I’ve been involved in the golf business since 1991, and my brother’s been in the golf business since 2004, so we’ve been in the golf business a long time,” Brian Wursten said. “But we’re really not great players or things like that. There’s so many other things that we have done. We have the huge Junior program. I’ve always been involved with the high school golf team.”

As the Golf Fore Kids community prepares for the Hall of Fame Induction and its upcoming tournament, Brian Wursten ensures that because everyone buys in—not just monetarily, but also physically and mentally—it leads to everyone having a good time while ultimately supporting someone in need.

“It’s not a job like you would with a lot of fundraising and tournaments. It’s just fun,” he said.

“It puts the word ‘fun’ in fundraiser.”

The Kingdom of God

What is the Kingdom of God? What saith the scriptures? The answer is given to us in Genesis 1:1 "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." Therefore, a wise student of God's word during this current dispensation of grace will obey 2 Timothy 2:15 "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."
